Cadets receive a fiveminute break, and then must tread water for another five minutes without touching the bottom or sides of the pool. From the side of the pool, the Cadet must step backwards into the water. They must hold on to the M16 at all times, remove the blindfold, and then swim to the side of the pool. 

At the conclusion of this course, you will be capable of planning, coordinating, navigating, motivating and leading a team or squad in the execution of a tactical mission during a classroom PE, a Leadership Lab, or during a Situational Training Exercise STX in a field environment. Successful completion of this course will help prepare you for success at the ROTC Leader Development and Assessment Course LDAC which you will attend next summer at Fort Lewis, WA. 
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You will receive systematic and specific feedback on your leader attributes values and core leader competencies from your instructor and other ROTC cadre and MSL IV Cadets who will evaluate you using the ROTC Leader Development Program LDP model. CREDIT HOURS This 3 credit hour MSCI 3101 course and 1 credit hour MSCI 3101 L lab requires 3 hours of classroom or direct faculty instruction and one 8hour Saturday leadership lab a month. It also includes up to 6 hours of out of class student work each week for approximately 15 weeks. Out of class work may include, but is not limited to required reading, library research, studio work, practical exercises, internships, written assignments, and study time for guizzes and exams. There will be various events that require attendance, to include Field Training Exercises FTXs, Physical Training PT, Army Physical Fitness Tests APFTs, Fund Raisers, Color Guards, Red Cross Blood Drives, the Military Ball, Raider Challenge meets, High School Drill Meets, Commissioning Ceremonies, and Guest Speaker Events. Contracted Cadets will be required to attend many, if not all, of these events. 



Cadets learn management and leadership skills not available in other University programs. They practiced throwing hand grenades, did a mock battle buddy live fire exercise, and qualified on the electronic pop up range. The cadets specifically enjoyed this one and got to show their skills in marksmanship.

It was a competition between the JROTC programs to see who could find the most points in the least amount of time. Awards were given out to the teams that placed, and booths were set up to promote the Rattler Battalions special teams. Our Cadets enjoyed interacting with, helping out, and explaining to the junior cadets what their future college life would be like in the Rattler Battalion. The lab was a rehearsal, ensuring all cadets know what they will be doing on the day of the event. The Orienteering meet will be this Saturday, 29 February 2020 and will be for the JROTC cadets in the San Antonio area. The goal is for the Cadets to do their best during 2 minutes of pushups, 2 minutes of situps, and end with a 2 mile run. Every time the Cadets take the test, a sense of friendly competition can be felt as they all want to see who can do the best and get the highest score. The Cadets tested their physical strength and resolve going up, down, over, and under each obstacle. They faced their fears and built confidence with each obstacle they overcame. The cadets set up in the forest and waited quietly for the patrol. They initiated the ambush with a claymore as the patrol passed and completed the mission with ease. This is a military tradition that represents a formal transfer of authority and responsibility for a unit from one commanding officer to another. We were able to recognize the outgoing Cadet Zane Martinez and Cadet Joshua Tinajero as the incoming Battalion Commander. This position is a huge responsibility and a great honor for any Cadet to receive. All cadets did a fantastic job pushing themselves through 18.6 miles to reach their time requirement. Congratulations to Cadets Aylin Hernandez, Seth Roen, Eric Sledge, Natalie Jimenez, Preston Robbins, Anna Lee, Malleigh Ebel, Kaitlyn Killebrew, Nicolas Miller, Michael Floore, Miguel Trevino, Hannah Wright, and our Cadre, Major Ferguson. You make the Rattler Battalion proud!

It may have been cold, but that didnt stop the cadets from having an intense game. An area defense was set up at St Marys Law Field to repel an incoming OPFOR attack. The defending cadets held firm against an aggressive assaulting force and learned a lot throughout the whole mission. A select few MS1s and MS2s set up a defense using barrels and natural cover while the rest of the battalion, led by MS3s, moved up and attacked the position. The cadets learned a lot from this lab and will put this knowledge to use in their future missions. The goal of the lab was to instruct and practice what to do with an enemy prisoner of war, or EPW, as well as how to perform aid on an injured person. The cadets performed exceptionally well during the practical exercise portion of the lab, exhibiting their grasp on the content taught. This event was designed to allow the Cadets to use what they learned from their military training labs to compete against one another. The Cadets were split into platoons and participated in a series of battles, ending with a one platoon identified as the Rattler Battalion paintball champions for the semester. With the semester soon coming to a close and the Fall FTX complete, cadets utilized this training to practice their land navigation skills and improve on areas of weakness when maneuvering through various terrains. Cadets began with a brief

refresher course on land navigation basics, giving junior cadets the opportunity to gain tips from their senior peers. Cadets then received a map of the training area, moved on to plotting three 8digit grid points, and began route planning. Cadets finally are encouraged to maneuver through the terrain individually, using only their map, a compass, critical thinking, and time management. The Rattler Battalion has learned over time, it is increased repetition of land navigation practice that produces the most success in their cadets.

It is one of the Rattler Battalions top priority to give its cadets the greatest opportunity for success in the basic soldiering skills. The Cadets gained valuable experience and familiarization with the M4 assault rifle, where they implemented the Army standard marksmanship techniques to zero and engage their targets from 25 to 300 meters. Cadets practiced firing from the standing, kneeling, pronesupported, and proneunsupported firing positions. They were also given the opportunity to get real time positive feedback by applying what they learned by shooting at metal silhouette targets, which allowed them to hear and see them effectively engage a target from the 150 meters and also the 200 meter distance. This training will benefit the Cadets who will be attending Advance Camp in the summer of 2020, where they will be tested in their marksmanship abilities. This training took place under the careful coaching and supervision of Rattler Battalion cadre MSG Ramirez, SFC Eggert and MAJ Glosser Marys University campus, in the University Center. The ceremony was a great opportunity for Saint Mary's student veterans, their families, and all other guests to share a moment of appreciation and gratitude for our nations Veterans. The Saint Mary's University Wind Ensemble provided a salute to our Veterans, Soldiers, and Cadets in their amazing renditions of the National Anthem vocal by Eva Alpar, Senior MusicVocal major and the Armed Forces Medley. The audience were rewarded by hearing an incredibly inspirational speech by the ceremonys guest speaker CSM Thomas Oates, the Brookes Army Medical Center Command Sergeant Major. The Rattler Battalion would also like to extend our gratitude to President Mengler, REV Eden, and LTC Soto for their participation in the ceremony. The Cadets and Cadre held a tailgate, serving burgers and hotdogs to JROTC and Rattler Battalion Cadets, operating a recruitment table, and running the ROTC football toss in the UIW fan zone.

The Cadets had the opportunity to participate in the unfurling of the football fieldsized American flag during the National Anthem, and the Rattler Battalion pushup squad was in the endzone after every UIW score with a display of our Cadets physical fitness. The Rattler Battalion would like to thank Grunt Style for providing all ROTC and JROTC Cadets with military appreciation day tshirts, and Jimmy Johns who provided all Cadets with a deli box lunch! This competition consisted of several track and field events, swimming, first aid and NBC testing, pistol marksmanship qualification, and concluded with a 12 km road march with a 30lbs rucksack. In the end, Rattler Battalion had two Cadets qualify for the gold badge, three Cadets qualify for the silver badge, and one Cadet qualify for Bronze. Congratulations to Cadets Casey, Clark, Killbrew, Kujawa, Martinez and Miller for this individual achievement and for representing the Rattler Battalion at this prestigious event Upon arrival, the cadets rucked three miles to their area of operations. They took a land navigation written test, followed by practical exercises consisting of two day iterations and one night iteration. The next morning, the cadets split into five squads and received their mission brief for simulated training exercises STX. Each squad conducted an attack, movement to contact, react to contact, ambush, and reconnaissance missions. These exercises were designed to test the cadets' tactical knowledge, mental agility, and leadership ability to assess how they handle stressful situations. On Sunday morning, the cadets received training on how to properly call for indirect fires as well as how to tactically cross open fields, roads, and trails before movement back to St. Mary's University. The Rattler Battalion showed up highly motivated, demonstrated a high level of proficiency in tough situations, and really showed what it means to be part of a team.

On October 8th, the Rattler Battalion had the pleasure of getting a visit from Command Sergeant

Major Bunn. Instead of the usual class curriculum, Cadets received a personal class on leadership and responsibility. Big shout out to the Command Sergeant Major for taking the time to provide our Cadets guidance, information and motivation on this morning! The team pushed themselves to physical and mental peaks as they competed in events such as the army combat fitness test, a tactical combat casualty care lane, rifle marksmanship, a grenades course, a onerope bridge, and an extremely rigorous commander's challenge. They had the challenge of training the firstyear cadets who composed half of the team, resulting in an outstanding performance.
